GFWC FLORIDA PRESIDENT'S PROJECT: A FLIGHT TO HONOR - MARCH 11TH, 2026

GFWC Florida President, Sara Dessureau, is proud to have chosen to honor our GFWC Florida women veterans with her state project - A FLIGHT TO HONOR!

Goal: To raise \$150,000 to fully fund one flight for GFWC Florida Women Veterans including all associated costs (hotel before and after flight, meals, guardians' fees and more) Cost for one veteran to attend is approximately \$900.00.

- 1) Any monies raised above the cost(s) of the flight will be used toward helping women veterans in the State of Florida.
- 2) A total of 172 GFWC Florida women veterans will be able to experience this wonderful adventure. Veteran members must complete an application and then will be entered into a lottery to be chosen for the trip. Veterans must be a current member of a GFWC Florida club and have served in any branch of the service, for any amount of time.
- 3) The Flight to Honor program is funded exclusively from donations. The chartered flight leaves from the Lakeland Linder Int'l Airport in Lakeland Florida.
- 4) The veterans will embark on a one-day trip to Washington, D.C. which includes a visit to The WWII Memorial, The Korean War Memorial, The Lincoln Memorial and The Vietnam Wall Memorial as well as a trip to Arlington National Cemetery to see the Changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Veterans are welcomed home with a celebration that can be attended by everyone.
- 5) The Woman's Club of Lakeland will be hosting a dinner the night before the flight for all veterans, guardians as well as any GFWC Florida member that would like to attend the sendoff. Details will be available closer to the date of the flight.

A Flight to Honor



Below is a letter written to Flight to Honor by a veteran who was on the April 30th, 2024 flight. He wrote the letter when he returned home and it shows the impact we have and the difference we make in the lives of these veterans.

Yesterday, I was transported back in time. First, to the date of April 26, 1970, when as a young 19 year old boy, I left for my new duty assignment in Thailand, only to be told upon arrival that my orders had been changed and I was going to Vietnam. In War you endure one day at a time, you survive, how you do that is you look forward to that one day in the future when you would be going home. For me, that was April 26, 1971. Yesterday I was transported back in time to that day. I remembered how I walked across the flightline to my freedom bird which would take me home. I remembered how at the top of the steps before entering the plane, I looked back to see hundreds of flag draped coffins stacked one on top of another. Those boys were going home also. I remembered how, after a year of waiting, I was kicked off my flight home in Japan for an emergency leave. My replacement plane was then diverted to Alaska. Finally, after one year, I arrived in San Francisco back on American soil. It was 3 a.m. and I remember walking through the airport totally alone. I remember boarding my flight from there to my home in Indianapolis where I was greeted solely by my mother.

I can't adequately describe what happened yesterday. After a pleasant, but long day in Washington D.C., again I boarded a plane to go home. On the flight home we had mail call, the most looked to thing in Vietnam, and I had mail. I had cards and letters from many of you thanking me for my service and welcoming me back home. I had letters from people I may never know, wishing me the same. When we arrived in Lakeland, I expected a nice welcome home from perhaps a hundred or so people. I was mistaken. When I stepped to the door of the plane to disembark, I couldn't believe my eyes. There was a police line rendering a salute to me, there were perhaps a thousand or more people shouting welcome home, extending their hands hoping to shake mine. There was a band playing patriotic songs. Signs were displayed everywhere welcoming me home. And no Dear John letters for me! My sweetie was there with open arms and a kiss to welcome me back home.

Yesterday, my life was changed. A hole in my heart I had long forgotten existed was filled. I look forward to my arrival in Heaven someday soon. Yesterday wasn't Heaven, but it was pretty darn close. To anyone who played a role in making that happen, I can only say, THANK YOU, THANK YOU, THANK YOU! God bless each and every one of you.
